## What's the Difference Between Facilitation and Mediation?

## **IEP Meeting Facilitation**

**Goal:** The outcome of a successful Individualized Education Plan (IEP) team meeting is a written plan that specifies how education, related services, and supports will be delivered to the student.

## **Mediation**

**Goal:** The outcome of mediation can be a resolution to the conflict documented in a legally binding written agreement, or no resolution.

Who: The IEP team meeting involves the entire IEP team as dictated by state and federal laws.	Who: Mediation involves a limited number of participants, mutually determined by the mediator, family, and the school.
Where: IEP team meetings are held at the school.	Where: Mediations are held in a neutral location at a time and place convenient to all participants.
When: A facilitator usually works with the parties <i>before</i> they have reached an impasse.	When: A mediator works with the parties after they have reached an impasse.
What: The facilitator assists the team to work together to develop an IEP for the student.	What: The mediator assists the parties to discuss and resolve specific conflicts regarding a student's education.
How: The facilitator works within the IEP meeting process and creates an environment of open dialogue and understanding.	<b>How:</b> The mediator establishes the mediation process which encourages open-dialogue, understanding, and joint problem-solving.
Decisions are made by the IEP team, not the facilitator.	Decisions are made by the participants, not the mediator.
