## **General Information**

- Brassica oleracea var. acephala, Kale
- Brassicaceae family
- Sunlight: full sun to part shade. Prefers full sun in spring and fall but can benefit from light shade during hot weather.
- Soil Conditions: prefers well-drained, fertile soil high in organic matter. Needs plentiful, consistent moisture.

## Successful Cultivators

- Winterbor (60 days) Blue-green curly leaves.
- Lacinato Heirloom (65-80 days) Known as Dinosaur kale, tall, sweet, mild, blue-green leaves.
- Dwarf Blue Curled Vates Heirloom (55 days) Low, short, curly, blue-green leaves.

## Common Pests and Diseases

- Cutworm
- Cabbage looper
- Cabbageworm
- Flea beetle
- Cabbage root maggot
- Harlequin bug
- Clubroot
