










Retaining students through advising and support

(by cohort year)







Highlights and New Offerings

More than 21,000 Winter and Summer enrollments in 2024 — increase over 2023

Positive outlook for Winter 2025 enrollment — increase in Associate in Arts, graduate and continuing education students

- Offers students opportunity to catch up or get ahead in their studies
- Associate degree students can now use SEED funding to take classes in winter and summer sessions, which will help them decrease time to degree

Offering unique "winter only" courses — Civility in Public Discourse, Introduction to Data Science, Classical Tropes in Taylor Swift's Lyrics

Option to earn new undergraduate, pre-baccalaureate certifications — Ethics, Business Essentials or Entrepreneurship



Update on FY25 budget projections

Board-Approved Budget (Spring)

Shortfall of \$20M - \$54M

Early Sept. Revision

- Shortfall of \$20M \$45M
- Cost mitigation in partnership with academic sector
- Additional state funding
- FLSA impact reversed

Since Sept.

- Net undergraduate tuition shortfall due to unexpectedly high melt rate
- Net graduate tuition target overly aggressive
- Financial aid pressures

Mitigating the shortfalls

- Increase spring transfer students
- Increase winter/summer session enrollments
- Optimize student financial aid
- Increase gift revenue

Successful mitigation depends on everyone's efforts!



Providing affordable health insurance

- Benefits & Cost Containment Committee exploring options for alternative coverage
 - Staff, AAUP, AFSCME, FOP and retired faculty
- Working with Segal (benefits broker) to review options



- Segal analyzing UD employees' claim history to determine savings potential
- Also requesting current carriers to mirror existing plans for medical, Rx and supplemental

The challenge of deferred maintenance

A "hidden liability" for institutions nationwide — *Moody's Ratings*

 \$750B to \$950B over the next decade for 500 colleges rated by Moody's

UD has:

- 461 buildings
- Average building age = 51 years
- 10,000,000 square feet of space


